Through this work with these Teacher Directors, the residential workshops we run in SEN schools and the experience of our internal team, we have picked up some inspiring ways to begin the process with SEN students

Allow your students to play - use games and improvisation to begin to introduce the story. As you do this, notice what your students respond to and enjoy. You might start to see a Romeo emerge!

Explore the world of the play. Bring the setting into (or indeed out of) your classroom using sensory activities. Include objects to touch, such as sand to set the scene of the Tempest and smells to create the atmosphere of the place. Music can be a great way to access a world, a feeling or a character.

Use pictograms - (the Widget software 'Communication in Print' is great for this). Create an action and a sound for every pictogram and tell the story in an interactive way.



A common theme runs through these problem plays - in that they raise really important issues, all of which warrant good quality conversations about the key themes. Whether discussing gender, religion or punishment, a good way into these plays is to ask your young people to talk about the worlds created by Shakespeare. They can then compare them to any news stories they have heard from around the world. This may well help them to understand the context of the plays and encourage conversations about challenging subject matters.
